

St. John's Episcopal Church/Bethel

The Main Structure , built in 1898 started off as St. John's Episcopal Church

It is made of Anamosa limestone which provides opposing emotions: The Stone exudes strength while the texture suggest warmth.

In 1910 the hand crafted Fresco at the back of the main building was added.

1948 Parish Hall was built to help accommodating the growing congregation.

In 2007, the building found new purpose when it was acquired by Bethel African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church.

This church, established in Clinton shortly after the Civil War, owes its origins to the efforts of Sister Melissa Elizabeth Glanton, a former slave who sold books door-to-door to raise funds

Due to the pandemic in 2020 Bethel was forced to close its door and move to a new location.
